



Grupo EPM recovers operating control over two other water treatment plants in Mexico



Medellín, September 20, 2021 | In a new advance in the management of legal defense and administrative management of EPM and its subsidiary TICSA, control of two other water treatment plants in the State of Chiapas was retaken, infrastructure that had been intervened (arbitrary dispossession) by the authorities of that Mexican region. “We continue with the good news from TICSA in Mexico. Today we retake control of 2 plants in Tuxtla (Chiapas), which had been stripped by the Mexican authorities in May 2017. These 2 plants are added to the 3 that we resumed last week in the city of Tampico” reported the CEO of EPM, Jorge Andrés Carrillo.

The two recovered plants are part of the integral sanitation project of Tuxtla Gutiérrez: one is the Paso Limón plant that has a treatment capacity of 800 liters per second (lps) of wastewater and the other is Tuchtlán with a processing capacity of 320 lps. This infrastructure contributes to improving the quality of life of more than 600,000 Mexicans and contributes to the recovery of the Sabinal River, in the capital of the state of Chiapas, Southeast of Mexico.

In total, there were five plants recovered in Mexico, a result that financially strengthens TICSA, since it allows the return of the money from the investment made in this infrastructure.

The cases of dispossession were legally managed in defense of the patrimony with results favorable to the interests of the EPM Group. In this case, the recovery management of the two plants in the Tuxtla, Chiapas state, lawsuit was achieved before the Federal Administrative Court of Justice.
